Of all the questions the Bible asks, this searing question from Jesus is probably the most relevant to our age. For, it seems that most of us are indeed seeking to gain the whole world—one expensive piece at a time.

Years ago, it took many decades for the majority of American households to get true necessities, like running water, electricity and telephones. But, in our materialistic age, almost all homes (including my own) now have such luxuries as DVD players and flat screen TV's, just a decade after they were widely introduced. Even the manufacturers of these devices are astounded beyond their wildest dreams at how quickly the American market was saturated with them, how quickly these luxuries became modern necessities!

Of course, in themselves, there is nothing wrong or evil with such gadgets or labor-saving devices. These too are gifts of God, to be used for our good. But, when acquiring such things becomes the central focus of our lives, then we must ask that question: *"What does it profit a man to gain the whole world, yet lose his own soul?"*

For, as we grow more and more infatuated with material things, we become less and less interested in God. How sickening it is to think that we so carefully surround ourselves with every comfort and pleasure in this temporary life, but at the same time give little thought to where we will spend eternity! All those things you struggle to gain will one day pass to someone else, or lie broken and rusted. But, your soul will spend eternity, either in heaven or in hell.

As we prepare to celebrate the Thanksgiving holiday, it's a good time for you to look hard at your priorities and put your life back on track. Cast down the idol of self-centered materialism, and put God back on the throne of your life. Go to Him in prayer. Seek His will for you in His Word. Worship the Lord in His holy house. Stop chasing after idols of silver and gold, and return to the Lord your God! He is gracious and merciful, He forgives all your sin for Jesus' sake, He welcomes you back with open arms. *"O give thanks unto the Lord, for He is good, and His mercy endures forever"*(Psalm 118:1).

Unless you put God at the center of your life, all your labors and struggles to gain the things of this life are ultimately meaningless, as Psalm 127:1 says, *"Unless the Lord builds the house, its builders labor in vain."* Do not make your life a wasted pursuit after things that have no lasting value, as Jesus said to Martha, *"You are worried and upset about many things, but only one thing is needful"*(Luke 10:41-42).

Instead of being worried and upset about acquiring earthly things, set your heart on things above. Stop trying to gain the whole world, while losing your own soul. Stop clinging to the things of this life, for they are passing away. Cling instead to your Savior and His promise of eternal bliss in the life to come.

And, oddly enough, it is at that very point you will finally find satisfaction in your life. As Jesus says, *"Seek first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you as well"* (Matthew 6:33). The irony is, it is only when you let go from trying to find fulfillment in the things of this life, that this life finally becomes fulfilling. As St. Augustine said, *"Our hearts are restless until they find their rest in Thee."*

We are very familiar with the Christmas story from the *New Testament*. In this Bible study we will look at the many prophecies of Christ's birth that are also found in the *Old Testament*, including:

- ❖ He will be born of a woman—Genesis 3:15;
- ❖ He will be a descendant of Jacob—Numbers 24:17;

- ❖ He will be miraculously born of a Virgin—Isaiah 7:14;

Mozambique Lutheran Church Ordains First Pastors

Big things are happening among Lutherans in Mozambique, a Portuguese-speaking African country situated on the continent's southeast coast, above South Africa:

- A newly named church body—*Igreja Luterana da Concórdia em Moçambique* (Concordia Lutheran Church in Mozambique)—is in the

process of registering with the government. The denomination currently has 10 congregations and some 1,200 baptized members.

- The church's first eight pastors graduated and were ordained August 9 after six years of theological study. They are now serving calls to their own—and surrounding—villages while continuing to work their small farms and support their families.
- An additional 20 men have begun their pastoral training, with the hope that they might be ready to start assisting the pastors in new locations in two years.

- A property with five houses has been purchased and will be used as the church body's headquarters and seminary, with classrooms, dormitories, a kitchen, and bathrooms.

A "very important step" was the recent publication of *Luther's Small Catechism* in the local Chisena language, according to LCMS missionary Rev. Carlos Winterle, who serves St. Thomas Lutheran Church in Cape Town, South Africa, and provides theological training in Mozambique.

the many blessings He has poured upon Mozambique and for all supporters who are making it possible by their prayers and donations."

Those supporters include Lutheran Church—Canada, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Brazil, The Lutheran

Church—Missouri Synod, the Free Evangelical Lutheran Synod in South Africa, and the Independent Evangelical Lutheran Church in Germany. All have assisted the Mozambique church with financial support, theological training, and Chisena and Portuguese Bibles and other study materials.

The Lutheran mission in Mozambique has grown steadily since it was started in 2006 by missionaries of the Lutheran Church—Canada. The congregations are located in the middle of the country, in the Province of Sofala, on the shores of the Zambezi River—"a strategic place to reach out to the whole country," according to Winterle.

He reports a number of people from other villages and cities—even a government representative at the recent ordination service—are asking the Lutheran church leaders to come preach the Gospel among them as well.

Even more exciting than the August 9 ordination service—with an estimated 1,000 worshipers in attendance—was a baptismal service the day before for 53 native children and young adults.
