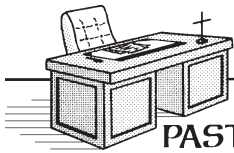

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"Remember those who rule over you . . . consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith" (Hebrews 13:7).

On April 23, 1891, in Philadelphia, a 24-page handwritten book was purchased at public auction. It was highly valued because of its author. Entitled *The Daily Sacrifice*, it was a book of prayers, containing beautifully composed, handwritten petitions for morning and evening of each day of the week.

Listen to some of its pleadings:

"Pardon, I beseech Thee, my sins. Remove them from Thy presence as far as the east is from the west, and accept me for the merits of Thy Son, Jesus Christ."

"Remit my transgressions, and cover them with the absolute obedience of Thy dear Son, Jesus Christ, offered upon the cross for me."

"I humbly beseech Thee to be merciful to me in the free pardon of my sins, for the sake of Thy dear Son, my only Savior, Jesus Christ, who came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance."

Who wrote these reverent prayers? Was it some famous theologian or great preacher? No, it was none other than a young George Washington! These writings, used for his own private devotions, reveal him as a young man who sincerely confessed himself a sinner, fervently prayed for forgiveness, and joyfully gave thanks that he had been saved by God's grace on account his Lord Jesus Christ.

On the third Monday of February each year our nation observes Washington's Birthday, which is actually on February 22. As we observe this holiday we should thank God that He gave such founding fathers to our country.

George Washington died on December 14, 1799. Though he was an Anglican, the memorial service on December 26 was actually held at Zion Lutheran Church, Philadelphia, which at the time was the nation's capital. An estimated crowd of 4,000 packed the church, including President John Adams, and members of the Senate, House of Representatives, and Supreme Court. A Lutheran pastor conducted the service,

and it was in a eulogy on this occasion that General L. H. Lee famously referred to Washington as, "First in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen."

We do well to pause on Washington's Birthday and thank God that He led men of the stature, ability, statesmanship, and Christianity of George Washington in the blossoming of our nation. For, while in many other countries the life of the Church and the open proclamation of the Gospel have been hindered—and even outlawed—by civil authorities, historically we have been blessed by God with an entirely different type of ruler.

Some suggest that George Washington was not really a Christian, and did not believe that Jesus Christ was his Savior. However, throughout his life he was a regular churchgoer—you can still sit, as I have, in his pew at Christ Church in Alexandria, Virginia—and when his family gathered for the reading of his last will and testament, these were the first words from him that they heard: *"My beloved, I sincerely trust to meet you all again in heaven, through the merits of my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."*

You may have heard it asserted that George Washington was merely a deist, believing in some generic god, but not specifically Christianity or Jesus Christ. But, both the young man who wrote the fervent prayers above and these final words from Washington are not the testimony of a deist, but show his faith in the truth of Scripture, and his hope of salvation *"through the merits of my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."*

Washington's faith was also demonstrated when the British had driven the colonial militia out of Philadelphia to nearby Valley Forge, where he struggled to maintain an army intact through the bitter winter.



The memorial service for George Washington was held at Zion Lutheran Church, Philadelphia. Washington began his will by telling his family, "My beloved, I sincerely trust to meet you all again in heaven, through the merits of my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."

When all seemed lost where did Washington turn? He famously knelt down and prayed in the snow, for God's guidance, help, and protection. As he wrote in a letter from Valley Forge on March 13, 1778: *"It will ever be the first wish of my heart to ... inculcate a due sense of the dependence we ought to place in that all wise and powerful Being on whom alone our success depends."*

Washington's praying spirit is also seen in another beautiful prayer that he personally composed for our new nation:

Almighty God, we make our earnest prayer that You will keep the United States in Your holy protection, that You would incline the hearts of the citizens to cultivate a spirit of subordination and obedience to government and entertain a brotherly affection and love for one another, and for their fellow citizens of the United States at large, and finally, that You will most graciously be pleased to dispose us all to do justice, to love mercy, and to demean ourselves with that charity, humility, and pacific temper of mind, which were the characteristics of the divine Author of our blessed religion, without a humble imitation of whose example in these things we can never hope to be a happy nation. Grant our supplication, we beseech You, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

On March 13, 1778, when things looked bleak for the Continental Army in the Revolutionary War, George Washington wrote in a letter from Valley Forge, Pennsylvania: *"It will ever be the first wish of my heart . . . to inculcate a due sense of the dependence we ought to place in that all wise and powerful Being on whom alone our success depends."* According to tradition, Washington dramatically demonstrated this sentiment by kneeling down in the snow in prayer at Valley Forge, seeking God's guidance, help, and protection. This classic engraving commemorating that tradition was commissioned by the United States and is now in the Library of Congress.

So, on the occasion of Washington's birthday, remember and give thanks for the miraculous guidance God gave to the founding fathers of our country, because of which we still today have the priceless blessings of Christian liberty and freedom of worship. Of course, not everything is well with our country, and it seems that even these fundamental freedoms could be threatened. Like Washington at Valley Forge, we should kneel and implore God to continue His hand of blessing upon our nation and its leaders. As Paul commands Timothy: *"I urge, then, first of all, that requests, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for everyone—for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. This is good, and pleases God our Savior, who wants all men to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth"*(1 Timothy 2:1-4).

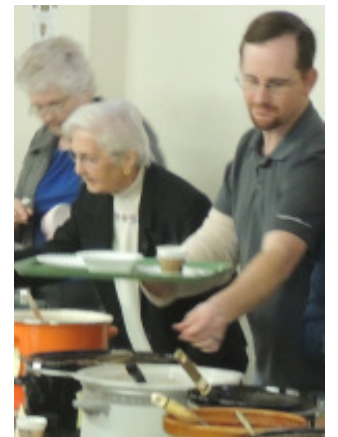

Kenyan Pastor Shares Gospel with Immigrants in Finland

What's a pastor from Kenya, Africa, to do when he marries and moves to Finland, just 450 miles from the Arctic Circle? Why, keep on preaching and teaching, of course! To the Finns, Kenyans, Poles, and Latvians who enter the doors of St. Barnabas International Evangelical Lutheran Church in Helsinki.

Rev. Richard Otiso was born in Kenya in 1970 and after marrying his Finnish wife, immigrated to Finland in 2001. Throughout his 16 years as a Lutheran pastor, his most treasured possession has been his Small Catechism in his native Swahili language. Rev. Otiso explains his unique mission work:

"I work with all people here at St. Barnabas International Lutheran Parish. We have people from East Africa, mostly from Kenya and Tanzania, and then we have Finns, people from Poland, Latvia, and many other countries.

"It is good to have a congregation such as ours, since some people are not comfortable with services held in the Finnish language. We are the only English-speaking Lutheran parish, and many Lutherans search for their own

affiliations when they move here. Religion plays a big role when people move to foreign land. The stress and other challenges make Christian immigrants look for people of the same faith.

"We have such a huge amount of immigrants who came to Finland in the past few months. It is said that Finland received over 33,000 refugees from Syria and Iraq. So right now my wife and I have opened a door in our home for two people from Iraq who are interested in Christianity. They have come in time to time to talk about their challenges and how they want to change their religion. We are moving slowly, but we are sure that in the end, all will be fine.

"Another time, I was called upon to translate for a Congolese refugee in one of our Helsinki hospitals. When I arrived, I found over 10 people there, who asked me to help them come to our Church by teaching them Lutheranism. I was shocked since I was there only for translation work, and yet by God's grace, it turned to be something else.

"We live in an immigration era more than any other time in human history. As Christians should see the situation as a golden chance to reach out to these immigrants."
