During March we are in the season of the Church Year known as Lent. Understanding the origin of this season, and some of its customs, will deepen its meaning for us:

Lent—The word “Lent” comes from the old English meaning “to lengthen.” “Lent” was originally used to describe early spring, when the days begin “to lengthen” after the darkness of winter. In time, “Lent” became the name for the season prior to the celebration of our Lord’s resurrection at Easter, which occurs in early spring.

Ash Wednesday—Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, so named because of the ancient custom of marking a cross of ashes upon the foreheads of worshippers as a symbol of repentance and humility, a custom still observed in many churches. This year Ash Wednesday was on March 1.

40 Days of Lent—The season of Lent is a 40 day period of reflection upon our Savior’s suffering for our salvation, corresponding to our Lord Jesus’ 40 days of fasting and resisting temptation in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-2). [Ash Wednesday is actually 46 days prior to Easter; the figure of 40 days for the length of Lent comes from subtracting the six Sundays during Lent, which are said to be “in” Lent but not “of” Lent.]

Holy Week—The final week of Lent, during which our Lord was betrayed and crucified.

Palm Sunday—The first day of Holy Week, commemorating our Lord’s entrance into Jerusalem as the cheering crowds spread branches before him (Matthew 21:1-11). This year Palm Sunday is on April 9.

Maundy Thursday—Thursday of Holy Week, on which our Lord instituted the Last Supper (Matthew 26:26-28; Mark 14:22-24; Luke 22:19-20; 1 Corinthians 11:23-25). “Maundy” is derived from the Latin mandatum, meaning “commandment,” and is based on Jesus’ words at the Last Supper: “A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another” (John 13:34).

This year Maundy Thursday is on April 13. We will observe Maundy Thursday with a special service of Holy Communion at 7:00pm.

Good Friday—Friday of Holy Week, on which our Lord died on the cross (Matthew 27; Luke 23; Mark 15; John 19). Even though it was the darkest day in the history of the world, it is “Good” Friday for us, because on it our Lord earned our eternal salvation by His sacrifice (Colossians 1:19-20).

This year Good Friday is on April 14. We will observe Good Friday with a special Tenebrae Service at 7:00pm.

Tenebrae Service—“Tenebrae” is Latin for “shadows” or “darkness.” In the traditional Good Friday Tenebrae Service seven candles and other lights are gradually extinguished as the Seven Last Words of Christ from the cross are read.

Date of Easter—The first Easter occurred on the Sunday following the celebration of Passover as prescribed in the Old Testament (Exodus 12:1-51). Because the Hebrew calendar was based on a lunar cycle, the date of Passover fluctuates widely according to our modern solar calendar. This led to some disputes in the early church

about the proper day to celebrate Easter. The Western churches settled on this formula: *the first Sunday after the first full moon following the spring equinox*. The Eastern churches settled on a different formula and often observe Easter on a different date. This year they happen to coincide on April 16.

The United States Naval Observatory has a web site which will calculate the date of Easter, according the Western formula, for any year at <http://aa.usno.navy.mil/data/docs/easter.html>.

Fasting—As a reminder that our Lord made the ultimate sacrifice for us, it is traditional to voluntarily “give up” something for Lent. This is often some form of fasting, perhaps eating only a simple, limited luncheon meal, or abstaining from meat or some other foods. The money saved is then donated to a charity, particularly to help feed the hungry.

Changes in Worship Services—Because Lent is a somber season focusing on our Lord’s suffering, it is traditional during Lent not to sing the Hymn of Praise (Gloria in Excelsis or This is the Feast) or use the word “alleluia” in worship services. It is also customary to read the Passion Story from the Gospels.

Lent Services—Many churches, including our own, have extra services during Lent that focus on the story of Jesus’ suffering and death. You are strongly encouraged to attend our Lenten Vespers services on Wednesday evenings at 7:00pm. You are also invited to enjoy a Lenten Supper in our basement Fellowship Hall before Lenten Vespers each Wednesday.

Jesus said, “Greater love has no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friends” (John 15:13). The Lenten season is an opportunity for you to draw closer to your Friend, Jesus, and gain a deeper appreciation for his great love for you.

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod has a rich history of sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ around the world. A few years after the Synod was founded in 1847, the first LCMS mission board was established in 1851. Since then the

LCMS has done or is doing mission work in more than 90 countries. Currently, the LCMS sends, equips, and supports a global mission team of more than 1,000 people. Also under the auspices of the mission board are over 200 United States military chaplains the LCMS endorses.

God continues to use His people to share the Gospel overseas, preparing them in His ways and faithfully providing for all their needs. Meet the Rev, Tony Booker and his wife, Connie, who serve in Prague, Czech Republic, where he pastors a congregation of English-speaking expatriates, and as LCMS Regional Director for Eurasia is building closer relationships between the LCMS and local Lutheran churches, so that we might work together more effectively in mutual mission and ministry.

Earlier in life, Booker served in the United States Army on active duty for five years. He majored in international studies and Russian area studies in college and graduate school. Then, after finishing college, he worked in sales and customer service positions for 13 years, which provided him with opportunities to travel internationally and manage diverse teams of coworkers.

Upon entering Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Booker initially had no intention of serving as an overseas missionary. However, memories of his own childhood as an overseas “missionary kid” prompted him and his wife to consider international missions. The mission board staff was excited by his language credentials and extensive cross-cultural experience.

Rev. Booker reflects, “I have always had a heart for international missions. As a ‘missionary kid’ myself growing up in Austria, I thought I would fly planes into jungle airstrips as a medical missionary. Then I received a call to the Czech Republic, which is a realization of dreams I’ve had for many years. I’m going back to places I have lived and worked before in my previous careers—but this time in a wholly unexpected way, not a businessman or government employee, but as a missionary.”

Rev. Booker now sees how the Lord worked through the various phases of his life to prepare him and Connie for international service. He notes, “Both Connie and I have lived in central Europe for quite a few years and have traveled throughout the Czech Republic, Poland, and Slovakia. The Lord has given us a love for the people and the region that

is difficult to explain. I remember as a child praying for years for the people behind the Iron Curtain, just miles from our backyard in Austria, that they would hear the saving message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. But, I never seriously dreamed God would answer those prayers by one day saying, ‘I’m sending you!’”
