#### "Halloween and Reformation Day"

Everyone in American society has October 31<sup>st</sup> marked down as Halloween—a day for trick or treating, dressing up, and spooky parties. Lutherans know it by another name: Reformation Day. (The great crossover happens when men dress up as Martin Luther and ladies as Katie Luther.) Other than that, is there any link between the two holidays?

The answer is yes, but not directly. What links them is what happens on the next day: All Saints' Day.

The first and easiest to explain is Reformation Day. Martin Luther had been thinking about indulgences for a while, and he wanted to do something that was very common in his day: he wanted a debate over this topic. He didn't want to start a grand movement to change the church. He didn't expect much to happen except a friendly debate with some fellow theologians in Wittenberg.

So, Martin Luther posted 95 Theses on indulgences to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. He did this knowing that many people would be in church the next Sunday, because it was a holiday where everyone got the day off in order to come to church. The door of the church served as a bulletin board for the whole community to see what was going on.

What happened to the 95 Theses is that a printer took the notice down, turned it into a reproducible pamphlet, and sent it everywhere. Eventually this invitation to a debate turned into an inquiry and more as bishops and Pope sought to silence this professor from a small, German university.

So what about Halloween? Contrary to what modern atheists and pagans say, it is *not* related to a Celtic festival called "Samhaim" Nor is its origins satanic.

Halloween is directly related to All Saints' Day, also called "All Hallows Day." It was first celebrated on May 13<sup>th</sup> in 609 by Pope Benedict III, but Pope Gregory IV moved it in 835 to November 1<sup>st</sup>. There are no records by any of these popes to Samhaim. Rather, All Saints' Day was intended to honor all of the saints who did not have their own "Feast Day" (see page xi in your hymnal). Lutherans would later expand All Saints' Day to include all who have gone before us in the faith to their eternal

reward, not just those who have been "canonized" as saints by the Pope.

Halloween was simply the Eve of All Hallows Day, or "Hallows-evening," shortened to "Hallowse'en," then "Halloween."

The practice of dressing up is also related to this church holiday. There are two ways this was practiced. The first was through parties called *Danse Macabre* where people would dress up like the dead and also the living, and they would dance together. This sent the message that all would eventually die, but that we would dance together one day when death was defeated.

Secondly, trick or treating came from a practice where the poor (later, children) would go around the community, knocking on doors and offering prayers for the departed in return for food in the form of small cakes. Shakespeare records this practice in his play *Two Gentlemen of Verona* with the words "like a beggar at Hallowmas."

These two practices would merge, with people dressing up *and* going door-to-door asking for treats. The idea of tricking people if they did not give treats perhaps grew out of some mischievous instinct in humanity, suggesting that the dead would come back to trick you if you did not give the treats as requested.

So what are Christians to make of these holidays? First, go ahead and celebrate them! We transfer the celebration of Reformation Day to the last Sunday in October. Consider watching a Luther movie or learning more about Martin Luther's life and why we are named "Lutheran." Secondly, come to church the Sunday after for "All Saints' Day" and praise God for the eternal life he has granted to our loved ones. Between those dates, enjoy some good Halloween fun. Consider leaving behind the ghoulish, demonic aspects.

Finally, remember always that Christ has won the victory over death and now has the keys of Death and Hades. Our departed loved ones are save in His arms, and nothing can come back from death to spook us.
