"A Call to Repentance"

Our District President has issued a request for a "Day of Repentance" for the Kansas District. He has done this since calling a Day of Repentance in response to the Coronavirus Pandemic. Here is the request:

This Ash Wednesday, February 14, the Kansas District will be observing a Day of Repentance, which will provide us with an opportunity to reflect on what God has been trying to teach us during this pandemic, and to turn back to Him. We encourage everyone to pray the Litany, reflect, repent, and fast. We also encourage giving to those in need, whether to the annual Kansas District Ash Wednesday Offering or another worthy cause. Ash Wednesday will also mark the beginning of another round of "Together We Pray" prayers; the daily prayers will be available at *kslcms.org* February 1.

What is a "Day of Repentance"? Is it new? Why participate in it? These are good questions. To the first question, a Day of Repentance is anything *but* new. There are many Scriptural and historical examples of Days of Repentance. These are combined with calls for fasting.

Joel, for example, begins his book with a call to repentance: "Consecrate a fast; call a solemn assembly. Gather the elders and all the inhabitants of the land to the house of the Lord your God, and cry out to the Lord" (Joel 1:14). He would repeat this later with similar language (2:15–16).

Who can consecrate a fast or call the people together? Certainly priests (Joel 2:17), but also kings. After Jonah preached to pagan Ninevah, the king "arose from his throne, removed his robe, covered himself with sackcloth, and sat in ashes" (Jonah 3:6). He then issued a decree for a fast:

By the decree of the king and his nobles: Let neither man nor beast, herd nor flock, taste anything. Let them not feed or drink water, but let man and beast be covered with sackcloth, and let them call out mightily to God. Let everyone turn from his evil way and from the violence that is in his hands. Who knows? God may turn and relent and turn from his fierce anger, so that we may not perish. (Jonah 3:7–9)

Even Jewish kings proclaimed fasts. Jehoshaphat heard of a large army from Edom coming against Judah: "Then Jehoshaphat was afraid and set his face to seek the Lord, and proclaimed a fast throughout all Judah. And Judah assembled to seek help from the Lord; from all the cities of Judah they came to seek the Lord" (2 Chron 20:3–4). His prayer to God is a moving one (20:5–12), and God answered him favorably, giving them victory (20:14–17, 24–30).

This has precedence in our own nation's history as well. Here is a brief list of Days of Repentance and Fasting:

- Pres. John Adams, "Proclamation of Day of Fasting, Humiliation and Prayer" on March 23rd, 1798.
- Pres. James Madison, "Proclamation of Day of Fasting and Prayer" on July 9th, 1812, in response to the outbreak of the War of 1812.
- Pres. Abraham Lincoln, "Proclamation Appointing a National Fast Day" on March 30th, 1863 in the middle of the Civil War. His words are striking: "Insomuch as we know that, by His divine law, nations like individuals are subjected to punishments and chastisements in this world, may we not justly fear that the awful calamity of civil war, which now desolates the land, may be but a punishment, inflicted upon us, for our presumptuous sins, to the needful end of our national reformation as a whole People? ... It behooves us then, to humble ourselves before the offended Power, to confess our national sins, and to pray for clemency and forgiveness."
- In more recent memory, Pres. George W. Bush in 2001 encouraged Americans to pray in response to 9/11, and Pres. Donald Trump proclaimed Sept 3rd, 2017 a National Day of Prayer for the victims of Hurricane Harvey.

So, what does this mean for you? How can you participate in this Day of Repentance? Firstly, spend more time in Scripture. If you are not regularly having daily devotions, consider getting your family together to have one in the morning or evening, whichever works best for you. If you already have devotions, consider adding to it or lengthening it. There will be CPH Lenten devotional booklets and another prayer aid in the back of church that you can add to your devotions. You are also invited to join us for our Lenten suppers and worship services.

Second, consider fasting. Although fasting is not for everyone (women who are pregnant or nursing, those with a chronic disease, the elderly, children, etc.), skipping a meal or cutting back on snacks in order to pray is a biblical practice. Even as Martin Luther criticized fasting because of its misuse, he called it "fine outward training" in the Small Catechism.

Finally, pray. How does Satan sow seeds of apathy and sin in your heart? Consider your empty heart and how much you rely on God. In your prayers, open your heart before God and tell him your struggles, temptations, and failures. Ask for strength and forgiveness. Combine prayer with reading God's Word to hear back from him.

VOTERS MEETING SUMMARY

1.21.2024

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Windler, followed with prayer by Pastor Woelmer. Roll was answered by 32 members; there were no new member requests. Financial reports by the home treasurer and mission treasurer were given. Pastor Woelmer's Q1 2024 report was given. Trustees reported that the property insurance has been reviewed, with deductible adjusted to reflect current trends, elevator inspections have been completed, and bathroom remodeling work at the parsonage has been completed. Reports were heard from the Endowment, Board of Education, and Blocktoberfest committees. Old business items included sign construction is nearing completion. New business items addressed included approval of membership transfers per Pastors Q1 report, directing Ash Wednesday, Lenten, and Good Friday loose offerings as previous year, and Pastor and secretary salary increases. Kitchen upgrades were discussed, as were continuing efforts for online giving. Reminder was given regarding the church being locked in conjunction with upcoming March elections. Approval was given to give \$500 in support of a mission family. Also approved was using \$150 from the general memorial fund to purchase digital certificates for Baptisms, Confirmations, and Marriages. Approval was also given to increase organist's salaries.
